NEWS IN CHINA

- The <u>Taiwanese</u> military remains on high alert as the People's Liberation Army (PLA) continues combat training of its air and naval forces near Taiwan Strait. Over 35 PLA warplanes have been detected operating around the island, with 16 crossing the median line in the Taiwan Strait or entering Taiwan's southwest Air Defense Identification Zone (ADIZ). In addition, eight PLA warships have been operating near Taiwan. These activities by the PLA follow the recent three-day 'Joint Sword' exercise. Beijing has justified these war games as necessary actions to protect its sovereignty and territorial integrity. Taiwan is closely monitoring Beijing's plan to impose a no-fly zone north of Taiwan, which, even with a reduced duration, may still overlap with busy flight paths and impact normal flight operations. Taiwan has also implemented no-fly zones in the past during its own missile test-firing activities.
- China's first west to east long-distance <u>pure hydrogen</u> <u>pipeline project</u> was recently launched by Sinopec. The 400-km long pipeline will start at Ulanqab city in Inner Mongolia and ends at Beijing's Yanshan Petrochemicals. The first phase of this pipeline has a capacity to carry 100,000 tons green hydrogen per year, with full capacity estimated at 500,000 tons. It is a part of Beijing-Tianjin-Hebei hydrogen energy corridor as it aims to replace existing fossil hydrogen production and bridge gaps between demand and supply of green hydrogen. Currently, long-tube trailers are being used to transport hydrogen at long distances which has a high cost and low efficiency. Globally, more than 5000 km of hydrogen pipelines have been built where China still lags behind.
- According to projections released by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) on Tuesday, <u>China's GDP will grow by 5.2</u> per cent in 2023 and 4.5 per cent in 2024. This is a significant increase from 3 per cent growth achieved in 2022. Given that China's economy is witnessing a swift reopening and a robust



- rebound, this would be a significant contribution to global growth. In 2023, the global economy is projected to grow by 2.8 per cent, which is 0.1 per cent less than the prediction from January. The advanced economies' growth rate will drop to 1.3 per cent in 2023 before increasing to 1.4 per cent in 2024. In 2023, India and China are anticipated to contribute 50 per cent of the world's growth.
- Xi Jinping, the General Secretary of the CPC Central Committee. President of the State, and Chairman of the Central Military Commission, recently conducted inspection of the Navy of the Southern Theater Command. During his visit, he emphasized the importance of implementing the spirit of the 20th National Congress, strengthening military based on the party's thinking, military training advancing preparations, accelerating transformation and construction, and comprehensively improving the modernization level of the army. Xi Jinping also praised the progress made in the construction of the naval forces in the southern theater since the 18th National Congress of the CPC. Additionally, he emphasized the need to strengthen the party's leadership and party building in the military, promote education on socialism with Chinese characteristics. and focus on talent development and anticorruption efforts. Xi Jinping urged all levels to address outstanding issues, inspire officers and soldiers, and strive to create a new era in the construction of the navy in the southern theater.

INDIA WATCH

• India's approach to hydrogen transportation differs from China's strategy to build new infrastructure. While China is investing in building a 400-km long pure hydrogen transportation pipeline, India's strategy revolves around repurposing existing natural gas pipelines, taking advantage of its low-cost renewable energy prioritize domestic generation to production of green hydrogen. India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi's

Independence Day speech in August 2021 signaled the launch of the National Hydrogen Mission, highlighting India's intent to become a global hub for green hydrogen. With its distinct advantage in renewable energy generation, India has the potential to be one of the most competitive producers of green hydrogen in the world. This approach not only promotes green growth and green jobs but also sets an example for the world towards clean energy transition. Additionally, green hydrogen aligns with India's goal of achieving a low-carbon economy and reducing dependence on imports for key commodities like natural gas and of petroleum. Repurposing existing pipelines also enables blending hydrogen within the existing natural gas networks, accelerating demand creation for green hydrogen in India.
